2022 Polices and Fund Updates

TAX ABATEMENT & CHAPTER 380 POLICIES


Chapter 312 of the Texas Tax Code requires that the Tax Abatement policies must be approved by the City Council every two years. The 2020 Tax Abatement and Incentive Policy has been separated into two policies for 2022: Denton Tax Abatement Policy and the Denton Chapter 380 Policy. The policies were developed to align with the 2020 Economic Development Strategic Plan and the City's Core Values. An Incentive Evaluation Matrix incorporating the strategic initiatives and values was also developed.

INFRASTRUCTURE FINANCING POLICY

The Infrastructure Financing Policy for water and sewer Development Planned Line funding was created to promote balanced growth through a program of infrastructure financing. The policy was updated to align with the strategic plan and incorporate Public Utility Board (PUB) and interdepartmental and input.

CATALYST FUND

The Denton Catalyst Fund was a strategy recommended by the strategic plan to support economic development programs, incentives, and initiatives. The fund expands the prior Investment Fund and is comprised of contributions of various funding sources. The fund helps ensure Denton is positioned to execute the priorities laid out in the strategic plan and remain competitive with communities with dedicated economic development sales tax.

Partnerships

Stoke Denton

Stoke welcomed new members, new employees, and new ideas. Stoke was happy to add a new community coordinator and a new associate director. These two have already brought a lot to the Stoke team.

Stoke celebrated Global Entrepreneurship
Week with a range of events with TWU,
City of Denton, RS Consulting, and other
community stakeholders.

In December Stoke held the Denton Pitch Competition, a shark-tank style pitch competition. Eight business owners were selected to pitch to a panel and three received prize money to help fund their businesses!

Stoke is ready for the new year and all the exciting things to come in 2023!

Denton Main Street Association

DMSA partnered with the Denton Parks & Recreation Department to present the Fall Thursday Twilight Tunes at Wolff's Park on Industrial Street—a first for the new pocket park dedicated to Denton's first women's interracial ministry group that started in the 60's. Downtown Denton was also a location for several larger Fall events, including Industrial Street Pop Fest, Day of the Dead, Arts & Jazz Festival, & Denton Holiday Lighting Festival. DMSA hosted Wassail Fest with tastings during Denton Holiday Lighting Festival. Together, all these events attracted more than 115,000 visitors & totaled more than 3,000 volunteer hours.

DMSA spent \$16,000 in marketing & advertising to attract visitors & locals. Marketing included updates to the DMSA website. DMSA also advertised Twilight Tunes on KNTU 88.1 FM radio, placed ads in print & digital publications, continuous social media campaigns, exhibit display banner, & a billboard on I-35 that is a co-op with Discover Denton to promote shopping, dining, & entertainment in the historic downtown district. As an education to entrepreneurs, DMSA started a business Master Class series with topics including marketing, small business banking, and bookkeeping tips. They will include more business management topics in 2023.

Denton Chamber of Commerce

This past quarter, the Denton Economic Development Partnership engaged 21 brokers, submitted 15 RFPs, and met with 40 businesses. The Partnership revamped DentonEDP.com to serve as a resource for business leaders recruiting talent, real estate brokers recruiting new industry to the city, and small businesses seeking support resources. Staff presented "Economic Development 101" to two community organizations and met with UNT's College of Engineering and Information to identify local partnership opportunities.

Our quarterly economic development forum featured a panel of local CEOs and business leaders – Jody Fisher of Fisher 59, Trevor Theriot of ManaMed, Steve Mears of Safran, and Joshua Fisher of Mayday Manufacturing. They shared challenges they were facing with more than 100 business leaders and how community partners could assist.

Culture & Tourism



Staff is coordinating with Discover Denton to keep the parking lot kiosk signs updated. Each quarter new signs that include special event information, a map of Downtown, and other cultural based information are installed.



Music, Television, and Film

Denton responded to two request for film locations from the Film Commission. For the first time since becoming certified, three Denton events were included in the State Music Office marketing efforts listing events on their website and social media. Discover Denton's marketing efforts of Denton events has seen an increase on their social media with Day of the Dead and Jazz Fest taking the top spots on their website and social media.

Strategic Plan Implementation

Accelerate Recovery

- Strengthened relationships with local and regional non-profits to gather information about challenges residents face.
- Adjusted the internal dashboard that guides economic recovery efforts to better suit the department.
- Continue to collaborate with the City's Community Development department to coordinate resources and efforts to support residents.
- Worked with regional organizations to expand the information sharing network beyond Denton County.
- Helped develop, market and score applications under the Small Business Rent/Mortgage Relief Grant Program

Foster Growth

- Staff met with businesses to directly identify business needs.
- Refined the City's database of existing employers.
- Further connected with real estate brokers and developers to increase usefulness and value of vacant properties.
- Added new tax incentives and policies that align with the strategic plan to the City's toolbox.
- Prepared updated draft PID and TIRZ policies for the Development District Manual
- Refreshed the Denton EDP website to be a primary portal for economic development projects, site location consultants, commercial real estate brokers, and other business decisionmakers.

Strengthen Community Inclusion

- Worked alongside partners to hold a pitch competition for entrepreneurs.
- Collected and reviewed data from local universities about graduate retention rates.
- Regularly met with key stakeholders to identify community needs and connect people with appropriate resources.
- Compiled a directory of Historically Underutilized Businesses in Denton.

Looking Ahead



- Continue strengthening marketing materials to better support local businesses.
- Promote the development of buildings & redevelopment of existing structures to attract business owners.
- Implement the new policies & tools developed to align with the plan.

Implementation Tracking

The City adopted a new tracking system to easily track progress on the Economic Development Strategic Plan. Efforts of the City's Economic Development Department and Economic Development Partnership have propelled the Economic Development Strategic Plan forward. As of this quarter, the team has accomplished 20% of the action items set out by the plan.
